#### **Session**

Holly Feather created the yummy cupcakes and beautiful cake used in the reception. Jerry Sankey and Allen Fleming were busy with many tasks. And the clean -up committee featured many of the same folks and others who stepped in to assist.

Session continues to review our church activities and worship in light of COVID. We are preparing to expand programs on October 4th. We will have promotion Sunday during the Sunday School time and Christian Education commission will present the 3rd grade Bible. We will be re-opening certain areas in the educational building for our Sunday School classes. Prayer time will be moved to the downstairs conference room so that we don't share space with Denny Shea's Sunday School class. We will be delaying openings for Sunday School again so that we do not share space until later in the year. Sunday School classes will begin at 10:00 AM beginning October 11.

October 4th is also World- wide communion Sunday. We will celebrate a little differently we will be offering bread individually packaged and will distribute the wine a little differently. We will offer communion inside and outside the building as we celebrate this day a little differently. A deacon offering will be received in the silver plates and the regular offering in the brass plates in the gathering space

This poem hits home with some of us in PW. Actually, it pertains to all of us since none are growing young. Our PW Fall speaker, audiologist Kate Faunce from Connect Hearing in Grove City, spoke to us September 21 about hearing health. We learned that "growing old" was only one cause of hearing loss. Two others are noise exposure and genetics. (Kate herself has had hearing loss since childhood). Several effects of hearing loss can be :

\*asking others to repeat...and repeat...

\*turning the TV up...and up again

\*having your spouse yell at you (when you didn't do a thing to deserve it)

We all enjoyed Kate's talk and learned that hearing loss is the only treatable risk factor to preventing memory loss and dementia. She recommends having your hearing checked. Dena Uber was the first to sign up!

After the program we had pumpkin roll made by Allen Fleming, and fruit cups and all went home with a goody bag from our speaker. Thanks to Joyce Youshock for arranging the program.

Not a day has gone by since our coming into the fellowship of believers here that, Tina or I, or both, haven't received some sort of phone call, email, text message card, note or letter from one or another of you. The totality of it is both overwhelming and quite wonderful.

And all of this has been BEFORE this past Sunday's Installation Service! We were fairly bowledover by the presence of so many gathered outside in the parking lot on a beautiful, cool, crisp almost-Fall Sunday afternoon.

As Dr. Bill Crooks observed in his charge to the congregation during that service, it is a wonderful thing that God does in our midst. Yes, while it is true that the lines at the Safari Park may have been longer and that more people may have been gathered in local restaurants for "last-day-of-the-weekend" escapes from reality, we gathered to praise the eternal God and King of the Universe and to ask His blessing upon us in a time when His message is oft-overlooked and frequently unheeded. ## CHANGE COMES TO GROVE CITY AREA CHURCHES

Within a week in the middle of March, 2020, American society changed dramatically and suddenly. Churches were not immune to the need to make radical alterations to their normal operations. Seven Grove City area churches responded to my request for information on how they handled the onset of what came to be called "Covid-19."

Some changes were made by all these churches: in-person gatherings for worship, bible study, and other activities were immediately curtailed, at least until May 10; churches have been resuming their in-person gatherings between June and September. All these churches began broadcasting worship services and some mid-week times of prayer and devotion using Zoom, Facebook, YouTube, and/or their church website. Typically several modes were used simultaneously. All churches canceled some activities and revised others. Governing units met more frequently to oversee matters (typically online), and pastors were definitely focused on the at-home needs of their people while adapting to the new playing field. If the congregation utilizes deacons their ministries have expanded, sometimes with new assignments.

When people began to meet back inside the buildings, signs communicating social distancing and other directions as well as hand sanitizers are everywhere. A few churches made masks and social distancing optional, while others recommended them and still others required these restrictions. Typically face masks were provided for those needing them. Books and pew cushions were often removed and gathering places were sanitized frequently; social distance (except for families) was usually encouraged or expected. Several responses mentioned that people are encouraged NOT to socialize with one another nor to gather in groups, even though this is contrary to normal practices.

The interesting part of the story is the creativity which the Grove City area churches developed to meet the crisis of social isolation. The primary change was the use of technology – for connecting with church members but also for coordinating leadership. Two churches (Wayside and Leesburg) soon began to hold worship services in their parking lots; they and North Liberty implemented a low-frequency AM radio broadcast of services to allow their members to worship closeby in their cars. North Liberty also redesigned its web page, took DVDs to members without a computer (providing a new player if it was needed), and mailed communications which others would receive online. Until May the Lutheran Church used teleconferencing by phone for worship and socializing. Technology helped church officers to stay in closer contact with church members than had previously been done. East Main also reported a lot of window and front lawn visits (definitely low-tech).

Music has been treated differently in the various congregations. When services were televised music was always included. Upon return to the sanctuary congregational singing is done in at least two of the churches. Others include the singing by only one person during services.

Churches with a presbytery or bishop expressed appreciation for the guidance provided to them during this time, and closely followed those recommendations.

Bottom line: Grove City area churches have confronted the Covid-19 challenge boldly and innovatively with new practices they would not have considered in other times. They took the threat seriously, with pretty much a universal acceptance and cooperation among their members. Attendance has fallen somewhat as in-person gatherings resume, but this is to be expected while we continue to live in the danger zone of the pandemic. Local mission work continued, though sometimes modified but sometimes intensified.

On top of the disruptions of Covid-19 several churches dealt with the extraordinary: in July the Church of the Epiphany (Episcopal) celebrated the ordination of Patricia Lavery to the Priesthood where she is now serving as Vicar. In August North Liberty began the new leadership of Rev. "Rusty" Stuart. Tragedy came to Beloved Disciple (Catholic) on June 27 in the death of their priest, Father Michael Allison, leading to their current priest Father David Foradori.

If there is a story to be told here, it is that the mission and life of the Christian Church will continue, even in the face of a crippling pandemic.

#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMISSION

The Christian Education Commission met on September 17, 2020 with Joyce Youshock, Adult Sunday School Superintendent and Elder, leading the group.

- Dorry Sankey, Children's Sunday School Superintendent and teacher, shared that Promotion Sunday is underway for October 4. The students will be promoted during Sunday School. We will have Teacher Appreciation for 11 teachers who will be given a gift for their service during morning worship. Carmen Martin is in third grade and will receive a Bible. Teachers may have 15-20 minutes of class time after the promotion.

-Dorry asks that teachers have a separate box for each student with their name and their own supplies in due to the virus.

- Liberty Lambs & Lions and CE will be meeting on October 4. Watch the bulletin for time and location.

- A list of current students from our church who are in college was in the September newsletter. Update: Nolan Mahaffey...14 Liberty Square, Rockland MA 02379.
